

One of my good friends from high school had a great sense of humor and exceptional intelligence. He and I loved school pranks, but I was more reserved—more fearful of getting into trouble over a laugh. Jonathan (now a Presbyterian pastor) always countered with a grand perspective, "500 years from now, who will care?" He said it many times, and it strikes me today every bit as wise as it did when we were 17. Somehow, intuitively, we know it's true—our time here in this world is brief, even if we should live to be 110. Five hundred years from now, little of what concerns us today will matter in the slightest.

Time heals all wounds, it is said and said rightly, but many live only for the moment and not for history. Do you remember what was eating you in January of 2015? Does it still bother you? Really? Of the things that upset you today, how much will you feel bothered in January of 2035? Probably less, and if you should go to be with The Lord before then, not at all.

In 2525, I'm sorry to say that your great-great-great-great-great-great-grandchildren will barely know you ever existed, even if you win an Oscar, a Pulitzer, and a Nobel prize, your name will be a footnote in the family history, lost and faded among your 2025 living

expect the first 30 seconds in Heaven to dispel 99% of the most serious questions posed by this life. After ten minutes (so to speak—Heaven is eternity, and there is no time, but relatively speaking), we'll have no questions left other than,

How can I continue moving closer toward God?

Then we and our millions of friends, family, and saints from every time, tribe, and nation will be gathered to give God praise, singing songs so sublime that a mere measure—heard here and now—would threaten to unmake us, undo us, and otherwise could turn the most militant atheist into a monk of utmost devotion.
